## **From the Library**







They can work jobs to help the family out economically. They can participate in male conversations and activities such as sports. Once these "boys" enter puberty, they

pate in male conversations and activities such as sports. Once these "boys" enter puberty, they miraculously become girls and a party is held to celebrate. However, this means they also have to go back to the limited and restricted life of a female. This book is definitely worth the read; especially as a fellow woman.






