Dear Friends

Did you know that Evangelism is really about telling stories? It's not about telling other people how they should think or what they should be or what their faith ought to look like. It's about telling the stories ab out how your faith – my faith – has grown and how God has worked in your life – my life. That's what Evangelism needs to be!

So I'd like to share a little story about my struggle to figure out my call to ministry – and my struggle to figure out effective Evangelism. Honestly, the stereotype was in my head, and it was very uncomfortable! You know what I mean – that stereotype of walking up to someone and asking out of the blue whether they know if they are going to heaven or hell. Or preaching <u>at</u> someone to try to bring them back to Jesus. It just doesn't often work that way!

So I learned from a woman who is very wise. She taught me a lot of things about both evangelism and how God works in our lives. First of all, she talked about God stories and how the most mundane, everyday tasks or activities in life are our God story. It's about connecting who God is and *who we are because of who God is*.

I had to write a paper for The Board Of Ordained Ministry that told them about my call to ministry. I knew that my call was

nothing like that of Moses or pretty much anybody else that I know of. It seemed that **they** all had these moments that God met them in some spectacular, miraculous way. Not for me! For me it was this growing sense over a period of years. If you read or watch the sermon that was supposed to be preached on February 22 (it's on the church website and there is also a link on the website to a YouTube video), you know that I talked about learning music when I was 5 years old. There was no way in the world I thought that music lessons would lead me to become a pastor! In fact, I didn't have any inkling when I was **16** that being a pastor was in in my future. When I was **16**, I remember telling my mother very explicitly that I thought it would be very nice to marry a pastor because I thought it would be a great life! Ha! After all, girls just couldn't be pastors – right!?!

Anyway, I struggled and struggled, worrying that my story was not going to be good enough to be accepted by that august body – The Board of Ordained Ministry. They had to decide whether I could be a pastor or not. But then, in a very still and quiet moment at home – in my dining room, as a matter of fact, with my kids playing in another room (probably noisily!), I was listening for God to speak to me about this. After all, the deadline was looming for heaven's sake and I didn't know what I was going to write! All of a sudden, I just knew. I knew that my call to ministry came out of all of my experiences, *shaped by a congregation*. They taught me about Jesus and the love of God. They trusted me and gave me the space to try my wings. They corrected me. They made me who I am and taught me my God story. I wrote that paper about my faith family. I told that erudite body of well-known and respected pastors about the congregation that shaped me. That is part of my God story.

So as we complete our series on *The God Story* this month, I hope that you will be fully engaged in examining your own God Story – your story in that is held in God, your story as God shows you where to go and helps you to know how you can be the
