Having the opportunity to go to the orientation for supervisors of Duke ministry interns was a gift. There

were two outstanding keynote addresses by Duke professors, and one of them has had me thinking about awe and mystery in worship.

When we walk in the sanctuary on Sunday morning and take our place, many of us reach out to friends and others that worship with us. What if we did that while thinking, "what will God say to me today through my friend – or through this person I have never met before?" What if we enter worship expecting to find God – to experience a word from the Lord?

What if we begin the Call to Worship expecting to meet God in the words that we say? What if we sing the hymns lifting the words in praise to God?

When you come to worship this month, will you fix your eyes and heart on the awe and mysteries of God, expecting God to touch you and transcend the mundane?

I love this quote from Annie Dillard's book, *Teaching a Stone to Talk*, and often yearn to see where God is ready to take us!

On the whole, I do not find Christians, outside of the catacombs, sufficiently sensible of conditions. Does anyone have the foggiest idea what sort of power we so blithely invoke? Or, as I suspect, does no one believe a word of it? The churches are children playing on the floor with their chemistry sets, mixing up a batch of TNT to kill a Sunday morning. It is madness to wear ladies' straw hats and velvet hats to church; we should all be wearing crash helmets.

Book Club will meet for dinner out on Wednesday, July 25th (Note Date Change) at 6:00 at Firenze Restaurant in Reisterstown. Our book that evening is Lilac Girls by Martha Hall Kelly. The novel is inspired by a real WWII heroine.

This year's Man of the Year came to our church in 1989. He has 5 children and 1 granddaughter. He was born in Baltimore and grew up moving back and forth between Baltimore and Philadelphia.

He worked early on in a Bakery and for Cloverland Dairy. Yes young people at one time we had milk men that delivered bottles of milk to our houses. He joined the Army in 1954 where he served in Europe with Special services. While in Europe he met and was prayed over by the late great Billy Graham.

Before getting into details that will likely give it away I want to read a quote given by this man.

"My overall thing is I want for young people to achieve and I will continue doing what I'm doing until God tells me That's enough."

This man was a soloist with the 76<sup>th</sup> Jazz army band and has worked with greats such as Fred Waring, Robert Shaw and Count Basie. While serving in the army he was tapped to start a full operation of musical activities in Southern France for the troops.

He has a masters from Peabody and studied at both the American University and Paris Conservatory. Currently he serves on the board at Peabody with a focus on diversity and inclusion. He taught choir and musical theater for Dulaney Valley High School. This man decided to leave teaching and put his extensive musical education and experience to use by beginning a musical group of gifted students where he could be free from a curriculum and teach in an out of the box fashion.



Our man of the year makes children a central priority in our community. He started Maryland Sings in 1990 where the kids have gotten to do incredible things like do 2 tours in Europe, Canada and sang at the White House. The goal of Maryland Sings is give its members a sense of self-confidence and allow them to fully explore their talents.

On a personal level I will say that this man sees potential in his singers that they could never imagine. I have worked with him on several occasions and his selections always seem out of reach for me but he knows better. I am certain it is true for many in our congregation that our amazing church choir was a significant reason to join RUMC.

I'm sure you all have guessed by now our man of the year is our incredible Music director- Dr. Bill Myers.

After a few days of training, the tour bikes around 40 miles to a new church each day and performs a program of Christian music and testimonies.
