From the Pastor

I am writing this article just after the Sunday when I talked about how often I see people withdraw from their family of faith when they need the love of their faith family and assurance of the love and presence of God the most. This is what I said:

> Life is often messy. It is rarely perfect, no matter how it looks from the outside. On any given day, we have lots of stuff going on. And if we don't, we can be sure that we are surrounded by people who do. When our lives are in shambles – when the chaos of life overwhelms – what do we do? The really scary thing to me is that I often see people I love simply withdraw.

> When some of our families are in chaos due to marital challenges or financial troubles or challenges with the kids, or even when there has been a death, often I see them withdraw. Maybe they are ashamed because their life isn't perfect – or they think that if anyone knew they were having challenges they would be

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judged by the very people who should be available to love them even more – their faith family. Maybe they are afraid that they will become emotional and shed a few tears during worship. Maybe they fear that they will fall asleep during the sermon because they are so bone weary. Maybe they can't face sitting in a pew where they always sat with their beloved. And maybe there are a million other reasons that they isolate themselves.

Mostly, I am guessing that it's to protect the veneer that most of us carefully construct to show the world how fine we are – how well we are doing – maybe even how blessed we are.

When we need God the most. When we need the unconditional love of our faith family.

Another side of that, though, is that when you don't have the opportunity to be in significant relationship with people who share your faith journey, it can be almost impossible to open up when there is a life challenge facing you.

This fall, we will be offering a special and unusual opportunity for YOU to participate in an event that just might provide the environment to build relationships, sing your heart out, and dive deep in

the biblical story.

The Event – A Special Musical Opportunity – for ANYONE who likes to sing or play an instrument (in the category of "we've probably never done it this way before") For several months I've been gripped with a call to revive a musical that I did with my choir some years ago, so I talked with Bill, and we are in one accord.

The musical is called *The Apostle* and is a musical version of the life and ministry of Paul - and it was FUN and memorable. **What does that have to do with you, you ask?** Well, I would like to gather as many of our musical folks -- choir members, non-choir members, instrumentalists of all stripes, from 10 to 90 years young, everyone who likes to sing or would like to participate in the dramatic bits throughout (or who might like to offer some refreshments afterward) -- to come together to present this musical. **But wait -- there's more!** As we are preparing the musical, we will also engage in a congregational study and worship series based on Paul's life and ministry. The plan is to read through the music twice before rehearsals begin. I've met with all of our music directors, and we now have a schedule ready to announce.

Dress Rehearsals with full Instrumentation:

Sunday, October 6, 1:15 pm AND Saturday, October 12, 4 pm

Presentation: Sunday, October 13, 10 am worship - one service only

*We will be joined by several members of the Covenant UMC (Gaithersburg) choir who presented this same event for their congregation several years ago and are very excited to do it again. It leaves an impression!

March 11, 2019

But now, says the Lord - the one who created you, Jacob, the one who formed you, Israel: Don't fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; when through the rivers, they won't sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you won't be scorched and flame won't burn you. I am the Lord your God, the holy one of Israel, your savior.

Isaiah 43: 1-3a (CEB)

Beloved,

The turbulent waters of marginalization have swelled and the scorching fire of rejection laps at the heels of the gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, transgender and queer members, friends and allies within The United Methodist Church. The days after the Special Session of General Conference have felt parched and dry and painful. On Tuesday, February 26, the delegates of the Special Session voted 438-384 to pass The Traditional Plan. By a 54-vote margin, a slim majority of the gathered voting body again concretized a second-class citizenship within The United Methodist Church.

Since 1972, our beloved denomination has inserted these words into our Book of Discipline: "homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching." With those six words we have laid on the altar of polity an entire group of persons and told them that their lives are unholy and damned. There is simply no other way to interpret it. I unequivocally disagree with that belief. Persons who are gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, transgender and queer are created in the image and likeness of God, as are all others. They do not choose to be who they are; they are living as they were created to be. They do not choose a gay lifestyle; rather, they are living as God created them.

In the aftermath of the Special Session, I and countless others have spent time talking people out of taking their lives, offering pastoral care to pastors and laity who have given serious consideration to walking away from the denomination and some from their faith. We have cried with them, prayed with them, and attempted to remind them that the General Conference is the law-making body of our denomination, but it is not the church. Quite often law and God's grace find themselves at odds.

The hope of the Special Session was that we would create a way forward with enough contextual space for all persons to live into our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Correspondingly, many hoped it would offer the

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opportunity for members of the LGBTQIA+ community to be equal members within our church without fear of consequences. The resounding justification offered by those who would not support the One Church Plan is that they could not be affiliated with a denomination that condones what they believe to be sin. As I have repeatedly said, well-regarded biblical scholars and theologians disagree on the interpretation of the scriptures used to support that understanding. The One Church Plan respected those differences and gave room for all to live into their beliefs with integrity. To say that you cannot remain in relationship with "sinners" is to deny the reality that our denomination, as is the case with any denomination, is filled with persons living in ways some would define as sin. Our current disciplinary language simply elevates one perceived sin above all others and castigates some to the exclusion of others.

We have traversed this road before. Our church law and God's grace have been divergent on many occasions. The Methodist Church divided over whether it was sinful to purchase and own other human beings in the practice of chattel slavery. The Methodist Church at one time required its ministers to sign an oath of abstinence from tobacco use. We argued over divorce and whether those who had been could serve as clergy. Our denomination wrestled with the inclusion of women in the ordained ministry. In each of those debates, Scripture was used to justify exclusion. Our Book of Discipline concretized those justifications. And, we have come to understand that those positions were wrong. I believe we are wrong once again.

In the great hymn of the church, *In Christ There Is No East or West*, we find these words: *In Christ there is no east or west*, *in him no south or north*, *but one great fellowship of love throughout the whole wide earth.*

I believe those words, supported by the Great Commandment to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, soul and strength, and your neighbor as yourself," are the heart and soul of the Gospel. That love is unconditional. It includes all.

I agree with many who have articulated that this is a time of crisis within The United Methodist Church. This is also an opportunity for the Baltimore-Washington Conference to rise above exclusionary practices to say unequivocally that we will recognize the dignity and sacred worth of all.

Take heart, beloved, and do not place a period where God places a comma. God is not done with us yet!


LIBRARY LOG

The Apostle by Cam Floria

During the research and finally the writing for the musical, "The Apostle", was the most inspiring project I've ever undertaken in my life. Thinking back to my impression of Paul, tha man, I used to believe him to be quite arrogant and overbearling in both his writing and action as ascribed to by Luke. Now, wonderfully, I've been given the insight to realize God made Paul exactly what he was—the chosen person to do the things he did, place in history at the perfect time to do them.

He was a Hebrew, but with special attributes...He grew up in

a university city of Greek culture; he studied to become a Pharisee under the greatest Hebrew teacher of his day; and he possessed the key to first century travelings...the Roman citizenship! And then, most important, he received personal instruction as to his calling and profession ("Woe to me if I preach not the gospel") from Jesus Himself. Paul knew what he must accomplish; he know Christ was his strength; he knew the Holy Spirit would mold his words; so when he said, "...be imitators fo me" he wasn't really being boastful in the human way, but was merely telling the early church that the Christina way was as Jesus instructed, and Paul was the voice of Jesus had directed to impart it.

Like any people in any century, change was difficult in the early age, and God allowed Paul to suffer both physical and mental anguish for the sake of Christianity to degrees too weighty for us to really understand. We can relate to some of his pains, but we'll never know all he paid for the building of the early church. He called himself the least because he persecuted the church. God, in His wisdom, has a way of taking things at their least and making them into wonders of the world. Think of the magnitude of the influence the words of the apostle Paul written nearly 2,000 years ago have had on your own life. What makes those words so real is the total dedication of the life out of which they overflowed...a life thoroughly directed by God.

I want to share with you a quote from the fifth-century scholar, Chrysostom, who said hundreds of years ago, "Paul, by his letters still lives in the hearts of men throughout the whole world. By them, all the faithful even uno this day, yea, and even all the saints yet to be born, both have been and shall continue to be blessed."

May some of those words once again fill your heart with praise as you now sing and perform them, remembering the sacrifices that took place in order for you and me to have this opportunity.
