Dear RUMC family,

Merry Christmas! (And yes, Christmas greetings are still appropriate until January 6!) It was a gift to worship with so many of you on Christmas Eve, and I pray that you had a meaningful celebration of our Savior's birth, even if it looked different than it has in previous years. As we approach New Year's Eve, I know many of us are ready to leave 2020 behind. There is hope on the horizon with the approval of two vaccines, and many of us are hopeful that we might be able to resume something that feels more like "normal" sometime later this year.

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Yet even in the midst of this less-than-normal Christmas, Jesus came and made His presence known among us - just like He did more than 2000 years ago. As I reflect on the miracle of the incarnation, I find it particularly fitting, at the close of this difficult year, that God chose to come to us not as a full -grown adult but as a tiny infant.

Whether you've had kids of your own or not, one of the first things you'll notice about babies is that they're *messy*. Diapers, spit-up, piles and piles of laundry - need I say more? Even when you bathe them and finally get them clean, they don't stay clean for long. The fact that Jesus became an infant means that we have a God who *isn't afraid of our mess*. God embraced the messiest parts of human life and isn't removed from the parts of life we'd rather run from or just as soon gloss over.

"Mess" might be a kind word to describe the year we've had. And yet, Jesus came to save us from all of it - from our divisions and the vilification of those who think differently from us, from the evil of white supremacy, from our loneliness and isolation, and from feelings of despair. He came and He still comes into the messiest of messes, to change us from the inside out with His love, to heal us, and to make us whole. When God became a baby, God left no part of human life untouched.

The other important thing about babies is that they're incredibly *vulnerable*. In general, we dislike vulnerability. No one likes being perceived as weak or dependent, so we resist asking for help, even when we really need it. We want people to believe that we have life figured out and that we can do this on our own.

Yet God took on one of the most vulnerable postures in our human experience, and in doing so, showed us that weakness and dependence aren't bad things. In fact, sometimes they're good, and necessary, and even transformative - because out of weakness and vulnerability came the salvation of the entire world. So in this season that has been such a challenge for everyone, perhaps we can learn from our Savior - to admit need for one another, to ask for help, and to stop pretending that we're impervious to the things that life throws at us. If there are good things to come out of 2020 (and I believe that there are, because God works all things together for our good), I pray that this is one of them.

In the coming year, may our lives continue to take the shape of the life of our Savior, and may we find Him even in the midst of our mess.



Good news!



In spite of COVID-19 and virtual communications, together we have reached out to many families at Glyndon Elementary and Cedarmere Elementary. Our angel tree was virtual and had different 'items' listed on the 'tags' this year. Instead of adopting families, we were able to help the families by using gift cards so they could shop for needed

items. School closings created a challenge for both schools and like our church, no one could go in except personnel. We work with the guidance counselors at each school who are virtually in touch with the students and teachers. Each school has a weekly email with announcements and information. We shared the flyers with times and days for the food pantry, the turkey give away, and for the community lunch.

Heartfelt thanks to many people who contributed to these efforts. Twenty-four families purchased gift cards which were organized by Lois Burton and Tammy Nash. These were used to help families at both Glyndon Elementary and Cedarmere Elementary. In addition, seven families contributed cash and other cards as well as community members who contributed gift cards.

Since Glyndon Elementary qualifies as a site for food supplements from Baltimore County, we could still provide for arranging to have gift cards and food and treats from the Food Pantry picked up on their usual delivery day. The guidance counselor assisted us with those efforts. Kris Brown organized food bags for the 26 families that we helped at Glyndon Elementary. She also collected items contributed by our congregation for personal care, and kid snacks. Laundry detergent, paper towels and toilet paper were also included in the items collected. Her contact with Sinai Radiology resulted in 26 fun bags. In addition, she contributed Christmas stockings with treat snacks for each of the 81 children in those families.

Cedarmere Elementary does not have food supplements delivered to the school by Baltimore County. We worked with the guidance counselor there to provide gift cards to 19 families. The guidance counselor mailed the cards to the families to help them shop for food and other items at food stores and Target. In order to allow for timely delivery, we had to have those ready to allow for delivery time.

A heartfelt thanks to the Kiwanis group that meets at RUMC who asked if there was a way they could be involved. They were able to help two other families that came to our attention through phone calls to the office. One was from the Chaplain in Harford County who is involved with Gabriel's Gift, an organization that helps people who are incarcerated there but have families with children in other counties. The Reisterstown family that Kiwanis helped has three boys and each will have a gift from their father. In addition, Kiwanis provided other items and winter coats, warm underwear, and socks.

The Food Pantry helped with a food bag and kid bags for each child.

The other family that Kiwanis helped is a woman with a difficult circumstance who asked for help with clothes for her two girls. In addition to that, the Food Pantry provided a food bag and the kid bags for each child.

The pandemic has affected all of us, and especially people who are already facing challenges of providing food and shelter for their families.. It is an honor to be part of a congregation that reaches out to help make a difference in their lives.

Dears,

Epworth Methodist Church celebrated its 186th anniversary on March 24 of this year. 186 years of witness is quite a great achievement. For many years since its existence, the Epworth Methodist Church had been a vibrant congregation that has produced the majority of the ministers that serve in Belize and Honduras today. However a close look indicates that this church has been losing members from some time now. For the last ten years, the congregation has been terribly decreasing in numbers. Members are aging, but they are not being replaced by young people. Today, 80 percent of all members are 60 of age and beyond. So, this year we have sought to reach out to the young people in order to bring them in the church. As a result of our effort, six youth will be confirmed in the church next Sunday, December 27, 2020. twenty-one other young people are on the list to be confirmed next year. This is a sign and evidence of hope. We have plans to continue reaching out to more young people and bring them in so that Epworth Methodist Church will not die even after all the elderly folks have departed this earth.

Your gifts to our work are the answer to prayers in our ministry and in our community. You give us hope that we will not lose sight of God's mission even when times are tough, and together we are working with God to bring about God's kingdom. I hope that you will consider continuing on this journey with us, and that you will support our mission.

Thank you for giving us hope for a world transformed.


